Theme Narrative:

A machine stops working and it's parts are harvested and reappropriated, but given new purpose. A human, heartbeat stuttering and breath stilling, slowly returns to the earth.

After mortality is extinguished, a creative spark lives on, and resurrects, whenever a life is changed by passion, art, expression, connection, love, and freedom in a community.

Celebrate the connection between machine and human. As the robot, we carry within us

continuity of ages and life states, like living dead. This begs the question, is every place we consciously occupy then also a graveyard?

Ticket Information:

Summary

Starting at 11 AM on Sat, Oct. 13, the 2018 Denver DeCOmp was an all day long event with full sound stages, fire performers and aerialists, live painting, art cars, photo booths, workshops, food trucks, full bars, and more!

Denver DeCOmp 2018 was located at a new location, Fox St. Compound, a huge non-profit resource and art gallery space.

Advertised Highlights of the 2018 Denver DeCOmp

- Four sound stages with live bands, acoustic & packed DJ line ups!
- Over 68 fire & non-fire performers & full aerialist stage!
- Dozens of art installations, art cars & theme camps!
- Full service bars & mouth-watering food trucks!
- Photo booth, live painting, workshops, cuddle puddle & more!

Community Participation

Volunteer participation was encouraged throughout the planning and ticket sales process. Volunteer shifts were marketed as a beautiful way to get involved and meet other radical people in the community, as well as receive a discounted volunteer ticket priced at \$5. Volunteers were also invited to mingle with the other movers, shakers, and makers at the DeCOmp Volunteer Appreciation Party, which occurred on Fri, Oct. 12, the evening before the event.

In addition to volunteering, applications for participation were submitted by the community in the following categories:

- Funded and non-funded art, theme camps, and art cars
- Fire and non-fire performances
- DJs
- Non-DJ musical artists
- Photographers
- Workshop facilitators

Also even if artists didn't receive a grant this year, they were still encouraged to place and share their project for the event.

Challenges

Due to changes with event lead and DRF board members, the planning for the event did get off to a late start. Unfortunately, overall attendance, revenue, and net income for this year's event were slightly down and expenses were slightly up due to increased production costs. Sante Suffoletta took over as event lead and the core team began planning meetings in late April.

Due to issues and increased cost with the previous year's venue, the team selected a new venue in 2018, Fox Street Compound, which had many initial attractive features. However, after approaching city permitting offices, we learned the venue was on the radar for several noise violations and for hosting multiple events without proper zoning permits. As a result, we were required to change the event time even after starting sales that advertised a later and more desirable end time. These complications put a strain on getting contracts signed, funding approved, and permits approved.

Despite these challenges, in the end the planning committee team pulled together and delivered an event that was well received by the community (based on anecdotal evidence and post event surveys). Our team connected well as a group and worked hard to overcome many obstacles right up to the event date, embodying the principles of Communal Effort, Participation, Immediacy, and Civic Responsibility. About 80% of the core team plan to return

in a planning capacity next year and Sante will return as event lead. Planning meetings will start in late winter.

What Went Well

- The synergy amongst the members of the planning committee team. Best team to date. Awesome communication, creativity, caring, passion, and follow through. Great chemistry as well.
- The most art grants for artists and performers were awarded to date of the Denver Decompression.
- We left the venue cleaner than we found it. Roughly 80% (or 750 gallons) of our waste was recycled from the event. LNT recommendations were communicated throughout the sales process leading up to the event.
- A fair amount of communications were sent out via social media and email that helped in building momentum about the event. Important relevant information was shared out, as needed. The website was updated with current information and kept it alignment with other communications.
- Tickets were purchased through givebacktickets.com, which provides an awesome benefit of donating a percentage of ticket sales back to our choice of local groups.

What We Learned

- It's important to start meetings early, such as in late Jan. Starting in late March was key to planning this year. We were able to be very organized and avoid last minute emergencies dealt with in 2013.
- One major reason is because it's important to start looking at possible venues early.
 We learned we need to check zoning / permitting with the city on any new venues before signing a contract.
- Don't get overly emotional about venue selection. Have a viable plan B early on. If Plan
 A venue can't deliver a contract on our timeline or deliver as promised, walk away and
 use plan B.
- Get information for funding approval into DRF as early as possible.
- Have a way to track # of artists who attend the event and follow up with artists who apply to confirm them going into the event.
- According to the public survey, people really enjoyed the sound stages and performances and fire art!
- Almost half of the respondents would like to see more interactivity and then, a third of all respondents also wanted to see more performance stages, fire art, and non-fire art.
- People seemed to enjoy the big open space, but there were a lot of mentions of wanting indoor space.
- A longer event also seems necessary.

Opportunities Moving Forward

Overall

- Start meetings in late Jan 2019.
- Start looking at possible venues early. Check zoning / permitting with city on any new venues before signing a contract.
- Don't get overly emotional about venue selection. Have a viable plan B early on. If Plan A venue can't deliver a contract on our timeline or deliver as promised, walk away and use plan B.

Communications

- Send out Facebook blasts from a generic DeCOmp persona
- More communication about the ticket tiers
- More email communications, instead of just Facebook event

Creating the event schedule was a good idea, but start putting it together earlier. Also
it would be a good idea to print it really large to hang at the venue.


Administration

- Before each meeting, take a look at the meeting notes from the meeting before


Miscellaneous




Have you ever attended a Denver DeCOmp in the past?




